- Block Watch isn't responsible for patrols or chasing criminals. Instead, the program offers training to increase your security and teach you how to recognize and safely report suspicious or criminal activity.
- Assure everyone that their personal information is kept confidential and compliant with the BC Personal Information Protection Act.



ABOUT

Block Watch is a free crime prevention program that encourages neighbours to work together to build safer and inclusive communities. Your local municipality, police agency or Indigenous office will provide a crime prevention advocate who will educate and support residents to help foster a stronger sense of community, security and safety by working together.

With trained neighbours who know each other, it becomes easier to identify suspicious or criminal activity and report it to the police. Block Watch groups can be started in residential neighbourhoods and multi-family dwellings and complexes. Proactive Block Watch groups can make a significant difference in preventing crime.

PROGRAM BENEFITS



Benefits of participating in Block Watch:

- Opportunities to connect with your neighbours to foster a greater sense of community.
- Gives you a line of communication with your local Block Watch office. Depending on your area, this may also include access to a police officer.
- Enhances your awareness of criminal activity in your neighbourhood, allowing you to take proactive measures to increase your personal security.
- Provides education about security enhancements that can improve the protection of your home and property.
- Explains how and when to report incidents to the police or bylaw enforcement.
- Keeps you informed with consistent updates on crime trends in your area.
- Acquire the skills to be an effective witness.

WHAT'S INVOLVED

If you are interested in starting or joining a group, contact your local Block Watch office for details.

There are different roles you can consider:

Captain/Co-Captain

As the Block Watch Captain or Co-Captain, you will have a genuine interest in reducing crime in your neighbourhood or complex.

The primary functions of the Captains are to recruit neighbours to join your Block Watch group and set up a communication chain.

You will also serve as the crucial link to share information between your community and the Block Watch office.

Participant

Participants are the residents in the neighbourhood or complex who agree to be part of the Captain's group. A participant's key role is to be aware of their surroundings, be familiar with what suspicious activity looks like and to report incidents first to the police and then to the Captain.
